

Purpose

The Friday Night Book is a prayer-based Hebrew reading workbook that follows the Sarah, David and YOU Read Hebrew curriculum. It revisits all of the special rules and reading skills taught in the Read Hebrew curriculum and applies them to prayers. In addition, students will study the meaning of the prayers based on key words, phrases and thematic statements that accompany each prayer. **NOTE:** To review reading skills and rules in the reading curriculum see the **Teacher Manual** and the **website** for video explanation, www.sarahdavid.com. It is also advisable that the teacher have a copy of the Read Hebrew curriculum (Three-Book set or Primer) to refer to as needed to review the reading skills that are taught.

Using The Friday Night Book

Main Sections

- The **Contents Page** lists the prayers to be studied. Discuss this page to teach the parts of the service and introduce the prayers that will be taught. Students can use the check boxes to check off the prayers that they have studied.
- The **Reading Skills Section** reviews letters, vowels, syllables (beats), and special rules to keep in mind when reading Hebrew. Discuss each of these rules with the students and make sure they understand them. Point out that the goals are to read accurately without letter or vowel errors and to read fluently, meaning correct reading of syllables and words.
- The **Prayer Section** includes eight prayers. Each prayer is organized as a four-page unit. Each four-page unit consists of the following:

1. Reading Practice

This page provides reading practice using words from the prayer. It includes a Reading Skills Checklist (see a sample on page nine) for students to complete by referring to the prayer on the next page. Students need a pencil to complete the skills listed in the checklist.

2. Prayer Page #1

This prayer page is used with the Reading Skills Checklist. Students need a pencil to complete the activities.

3. Recognize Sight-Words and Understand the Main Idea

This page highlights and translates key words in order to build a sight-word vocabulary. It also includes phrases and/or patterns in order to build recognition, improve retention and enhance understanding. This page also includes a thematic statement.

4. Prayer Page #2

This prayer page is intended for students to read and chant from. The goal on this page is fluent and error-free reading. NOTE: Check with the synagogue or temple chazzan for the melody students should use. The prayers can be heard online at www.sarahdavid.com in the Audio Section.

- Blessings (candles, wine and challah) for Friday Night and songs appear at the back of the book.
- A Writing Practice template is included at the back of the book. Photocopy and reuse this page as writing practice
 for each prayer and as additional letter and vowel practice. The Vowel Drill on page 13 can also be photocopied
 and used as a template for practice.

NOTES:

- In the Recognize and Understand Sections, nouns and pronouns are capitalized when referring to God.
- This books contains God's name. It should be treated with respect. If discarded, it should be buried in a genizah. Check with your Rabbi or Cantor.

- Next, you'll review the letters and vowels. It's always easier to read when the letters and vowels are fresh in your mind.
- 3. Then, you'll practice reading the prayers. You will read each prayer at least two times.

 There are also challenging activities for you to do. Once the prayer is easy to read, you can learn to chant it. Following these steps will make reading Hebrew easier and will help you when it comes time to prepare for your Bar or Bat Mitzvah.


Top Tricks to Remember When Reading Hebrew



This Reading Skills Review Section includes the top tricks to remember when reading Hebrew. Get to know these skills really well. They will help you to become a very good reader.


1. VOWELS

In Hebrew, vowels are symbols that come below, beside or above the letters. Most vowels appear under the letters. When reading, always look to see if the vowel is below, beside or above the letter. Remember to read these vowels from right to left.



2. YUD WITHOUT ITS OWN VOWEL

When the letter yud follows the <u>ch</u>eereek (•) or the tzayreh (••) inside a word and doesn't have a vowel of its own, the yud is part of the vowel. SPECIAL RULE: When the letter yud follows the patach vowel (–) and is also at the end of a word, it makes the "eye" sound. Drawing the "bean" around the vowel and the yud that follows helps us see this combination. Remember to read these vowels from right to left. Trace the EE, AY and EYE beans below.




3. CHATAF VOWELS

- 1. Pata \underline{ch} (-) and \underline{ch} ataf pata \underline{ch} (-;) make the same sound, the "ah" sound.
- 2. Segol (:) and chataf segol (::) make the same sound, the "eh" sound.
- 3. Kamatz (¬) makes the "ah" sound, BUT, chataf kamatz (¬:) is special. It makes a soft "oh" sound.
